CANALS WITHIN FOX TRAIL COMMUNITY



SNAKEHEAD FISH

PURPOSE:

- Reduce/eliminate the invasive Snakehead population in our canals. Snakeheads primarily eat small fish and crustaceans, reducing native fish populations.
- Promote conservation in our neighborhood. This is the start of a conservation plan to reintroduce Grass Carp which will help control vegetation growth along our canals.
- 3. Increase resident participation and social contact with their neighbors.

ROUND UP ACTIVITIES:

- 1. Round Up is Sat, Jan 4 from sunrise to 5 pm. An award picnic will take place on Sun, Jan 5.
- 2. Digital Registration on the **FOX TRAIL WEBSITE**. \$10 registration fee for individuals or \$20/family.
- 3. Residents must have a freshwater fishing license unless they are exempt per FWC regulations.
- 4. Guests (non-residents) must be sponsored by a Fox Trail resident.
- 5. Snakeheads should be killed in a humane method.
- 6. Nightly collection/weigh-in of catch.
- 7. Give prizes for youth and adult categories.
- 8. Award picnic, Sunday, Jan 5 for any resident who would like to attend.

Collecting Canal at the Weir Gate Re-Moving Day

Flood control in our neighborhood depends on well-maintained canals. This requires that land adjacent to a canal embankment be clear of trees, shrubs, vegetation and other encroaching trash or objects.

The collecting canal that lies between our flood control structure and the Florida Dept of Water Management Canals and Pump Station was overgrown with large invasive trees and vines and other vegetation. This overgrowth risked obstructing a critically important waterway and was providing habitat for the growing invasive iguana problem.

As of December 10, the collecting canal problem was solved. A big thank you to East Coast Landscaping and to the canal committee for their diligent efforts to protect our waterways.

Holiday Recipes

Sorrel • Roselle (Hibiscus sabdariffa)

Ingredients:

1 packet sorrel (dry or fresh)

3 oz ginger (slice into

1 cinnamon stick

1 bayleaf

1/2 teaspoon grated nutmeg

2 quarts water

Sugar to taste




Combine all ingredients, except the sugar, in a large pot. Gently simmer for about 15-20 minutes, then remove from heat.

Allow the mixture to sit for between 30 minutes to two hours to infuse. Strain the mixture into a jar or mug, sweeten to taste and dilute the mixture to your preference.

Set in fridge to chill and serve over ice.

HOLIDAY SAFETY TIPS for our furry friends



Use those fall pumpkins to improve your pet's health. Cats, dogs, chickens, and even horses can all benefit from **pumpkin's fiber and vitamins**. A substance in pumpkin seeds called cucurbitin that paralyzes worms in the digestive tract, making them easier to pass. Seeds should be ground first to avoid choking and given in moderation. Raw pumpkin can be given to chickens and horses but be sure to bake your pumpkin before giving it to dogs and cats.

- **Dogs** can receive a dose a ¼ tsp of ground seed per 10 lbs. of weight, twice per day.
- For chickens, 2g of ground seed per bird per day is recommended.
- For cats, a pinch of ground seeds on their food will boost the fiber and nutritional content of their meal.
- Hang those smaller pumpkins in your horse's stall
 for some environmental enrichment or cut it into
 pieces and add it to their feed. Just remember to
 remove the stem as it may be a choking hazard.



Even though our South Florida cold spells are mild compared to the northern states, remember, if it's too cold for you to be outside, it's probably too cold for your small pet to be outside. Please provide a shelter for your outdoor pets that has a wind break and some straw or blankets.

FOOD SAFETY



ADULT BEVERAGES

Adult beverages can be seriously dangerous for your furry friends.

Alcohol and liquor-infused desserts can result in seizures, respiratory distress, and incoordination.

Caffeine can cause hyperactivity, seizures, and muscle twitching.



SWEETS

Candy and sweets can be toxic to pets, especially chocolate and anything with the sugar substitute xylitol. Look for vomiting, diarrhea, weakness, and seizures.

LEFTOVERS

Bones can easily splinter or become lodged causing a medical emergency or even death.

Fatty and spicy foods, nuts, and dairy cannot be digested and can cause stomach upset, nausea, vomiting, and diarrhea.





FRUITS AND VEGGIES

Citrus peel and fruit pits/seeds contain citric acid and oils that cause irritation and difficulty breathing.

Grapes and raisins, even in small amounts, can cause kidney failure in dogs.

Onions, garlic, shallot, and chives can damage red blood cells and cause serious medical distress.

PLANTS

Jade, amaryllis, aloe vera, philodendron, begonia, snake plant, lily varieties (such as, peace, calla, easter, tiger, and day lilies), pothos, mistletoe, holly, and poinsettia are dangerous for pets and should be kept out of reach.



Invasive Species Around the Neighborhood

This issue of our newsletter we are taking a look at two invasive animal and plant species. There are many species of animals and plants that are not native to Florida and most are not considered invasive. For a plant or animal to be categorized as invasive, it must be harmful to the ecosystem.



Ecological Risk Factors:



Introduced to Multiple Locations



Present in Areas with Protected Species



Able to Spread to New Locations



High Reproductive Potential



High Climate Suitability



In Areas Connected to Other Natural Habitats

The green iguana was first introduced to the Florida ecosystem around 1964 via the exotic pet trade. They can be identified by a row of spikes along their back and upper tail. The juveniles are bright green and they change to an orange color as they mature. Male iguanas can grow to be 5 feet long and 17 pounds.

Iguanas dig long, interconnected burrows along canal banks, bridges that can cause structural collapse. Although they are primarily herbivores, they compete with native species for food and mature iguanas are opportunistic feeders who also consume native bird eggs and tree snails. They have proliferated because they do not have any natural predators and can lay up to 76 eggs in a clutch. Homeowners can discourage iguanas on their property by hanging wind chimes, CDs that reflect light, and filling in their burrows. The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission recommends humane killing of iguanas found on a homeowners property.



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The Snakehead fish is an invasive species that can be found in the Fox Trail canals. They are native to Asia and were first documented in the Pompano Beach area in 2020. It may be their popularity as a game fish and excellent edibility that caused the release into the Florida ecosystem. Snakeheads are carnivorous bottom dwellers that feed on a wide variety of native species including crayfish, other fish, insects, and small reptiles. They can survive in low oxygen environments and have been seen crawling onto land in search of prey. You can read more about the Snakehead fish at **SNAKEHEAD FWC** and **FLORIDA MUSEUM**.

In order to help control the Snakehead population in our canals, the **Fox Trail POA** is hosting a Snakehead Round Up on Jan 3-5 with prizes awarded for the most snakeheads caught (by weight). Following the Round Up there will be a neighborhood barbeque. You can sign up at the **Fox Trail POA website** to be eligible for prizes.



Another way you can help control invasive species is by clearing out vegetation that competes with our native plants.





The Brazilian Pepper Schinus terebinthifolius plant is a shrub that can grow dense foliage up to 40 ft tall. It harms native plants by shading them out and releasing a noxious chemical that prevents other plants from growing near it. This chemical also makes it unpalatable to animals. Contact with it can cause rashes and burning it may cause

irritation of airways. Eradication requires removal of the roots as well as the foliage. Long sleeves and gloves are recommended.

The Rosary Pea Abrus precatorius can often be found growing on fences or on trees. It can shade out or displace native plants. Eradication requires removal of the seedling and any seeds in the area.
