PHASE 1 ROADWORK BEGINS IN FOX TRAIL

Smooth, well-maintained roads are not just a luxury; they are essential for potential buyers and homeowners, as well as providing a satisfying experience for drivers, especially after dealing with potholes and deteriorating roads. One of the Board's top priorities has been the maintenance of our roadways, and we proudly initiated this process in April 2024.

After thorough research, numerous productive meetings, and effective communications, we are excited to announce that

the long-awaited road repair project has officially begun. We appreciate the community's enthusiasm for the project's completion, and we are fully committed to keeping you informed about our progress.

Phase 1 - The project kicked off on the east side of Sorrell and will advance from east to west on Mare Lane, followed by the same route on Shetland. The engineers from Federal Engineering and Testing are closely monitoring the project and have reported highly satisfactory results from their evaluations. Our project is not only on schedule; it is ahead of schedule, and the finished work showcases a professional quality and durability that underscores our commitment to high standards.

In alignment with the engineers' recommendations, the Board has decisively prioritized the roads in Phase 1 for repair to ensure the bridges' integrity. The timeline for Phase 2 and Phase 3 will be established through a collaborative decision involving both the community and its directors. Together, we are making significant strides toward enhancing our community's roads!

Progress, Progress!

2024 – 2025 Board Key Achievements:

- We have launched a new association website that provides a user-friendly platform for community members to access important information, including meeting schedules, community updates, and association documents.
- Development and launch of The Fox Trail POA
 Quarterly Newsletter available online at www.foxtrailpoa.com.
- Updated all association building applications with the addition of guidelines and checklists,
 PBC supporting documents on our website.
- Replaced the Fox Trail entrance signs with a fresh new look including decorated themed designs by the beautification committee at no cost to the association!
- We have reviewed and updated old contracts, securing better pricing for current community services.
- Development of a robust and understandable long-term budget.
- More efficient investment of community funds.
- Repair of potholes on ingress and egress roads leading to Lion Country Safari Road.
- In response to community requests, Phase 1 of road repair and repairing started on March 3, 2025.
- Proactive requests for repairs, including:
 - Coordination with Xfinity, AT&T, and FP&L to repair low-hanging and fallen wires within the community at no cost.
 - ➤ County involvement to conduct repairs to Lion Country Safari Road.
 - Repair of holes left by previous claw machines on common grounds.
 - ➤ Inspection of all bridges to maintain resident safety.
 - ➤ Upcoming plans include removing and replacing old fencing at the canals and bridges in April 2025.
- During the hurricane season, water levels were monitored daily to ensure safety.
- The 20+ year old Weir Gate was replaced with the installation of a new fish-catching device to meet PBC water management requirement.
- Canal clearing of both the east and west Weir Gate canals, as well as the central canal leading to the Weir Gate.
- Replacement of fish nets at three locations.
- Proactively maintained the removal of three large alligators.
- Assisted elderly resident secure landscaping services to aid in clearing lot lines that were interfering with communication and electrical lines.
- Assisted community members away for the summer to watch over their property and assist with various tasks.

Fun Community Events:

- Fishing tournament with prizes, followed by a community fish fry gathering.
- Community garage sale.

Bird Flu Did you know?



The price of eggs has risen dramatically since the start of the new year. The cause is the spread of the H5N1 virus, a type A influenza strain, (also called bird flu) which is killing the nation's egg laying flocks. The virus is highly contagious and can be spread through wild bird migrations.

Q. How is Bird Flu transmitted?

A. Infected birds shed avian influenza A viruses in their saliva, mucus, feces and other infected animals may shed avian influenza A viruses in respiratory secretions and other



body fluids (e.g., cow milk). Avian influenza A viruses also can infect the respiratory tract of mammals like cats and dogs and cause infection in other organ tissues.¹

B. The disease varies in severity depending on the strain and species affected. Highly pathogenic avian influenza (HPAI) strains are deadly to domestic poultry and can wipe out entire flocks within a matter of days. Low pathogenicity avian influenza (LPAI) strains typically cause few or no signs of illness. They occur naturally in wild birds around the world. However, some LPAI strains can become highly pathogenic in poultry.²

Q. What are the symptoms of bird flu in birds?

- A. Sudden death without any prior symptoms of illness
- B. Lack of energy and appetite
- A drop in egg production or soft-shelled, misshapen eggs
- D. Swelling of the eyelids, comb, wattles, and shanks
- E. Purple discoloration of the wattles, comb, and legs
- F. Gasping for air (difficulty breathing)
- G. Nasal discharge, coughing, sneezing
- H. Twisting of the head and neck (torticollis)
- I. Stumbling or falling down
- J. Diarrhea^{2, 4}



Q. What should I do if I suspect avian flu in one of my flock?

A. Report Signs of Animal Disease: Producers or owners who suspect an animal disease should contact their veterinarian to evaluate the animal or herd. Find an accredited veterinarian. Animal health professionals (veterinarians; diagnostic laboratories; public health, zoo, or wildlife personnel; and others) report diagnosed or suspected cases of nationally listed reportable animal diseases to APHIS Area Veterinarians in Charge and to the State animal health official as applicable under State reporting regulations.²

Q. Can people get the avian flu?

A. People rarely get
avian influenza A virus
infection; however,
human infections with
avian influenza viruses
can happen when



enough virus gets into a person's eyes, nose or mouth, or is inhaled. This can happen when a virus is in the air (in droplets or possibly dust) and a person breathes it in, or when a person touches something that has virus on it and then touches their mouth, eyes or nose. Avian influenza A virus infections in people happen most often after close, prolonged and unprotected (no gloves or other protective wear) contact with infected birds or other animals. People with close or prolonged contact with infected birds or animals or their contaminated environments are at greater risk of infection.¹

Q. Can I get avian influenza from eating poultry or eggs?

A. **No.** Poultry and eggs that are properly prepared and cooked are safe to eat. In addition to proper processing, proper handling and cooking of poultry provides protection from viruses and bacteria, including avian influenza.³



MSM COOKIES

INGREDIENTS

1 CUP BUTTER (2 STICKS)
1 CUP BROWN SUGAR
3/4 CUP WHITE SUGAR

2 EGGS 3/4 TEASPOON BAKING SODA 1/2 TEASPOON SALT TEASPOON VANILLA CUPS PLAIN M&MS (Easter Colors) 2 AND 1/4 CUP ALL PURPOSE FLOUR

Put the butter in a microwave safe bowl (like a glass bowl).

Microwave the butter for 60 seconds.

Add the brown sugar and the white sugar into the bowl with the melted butter. Use a whisk to mix it.

Crack one egg into the bowl and mix it in with the whisk.

Repeat with the secont egg.

Mix in the baking soda, salt, and the vanilla.

Put the flour in the bowl. Use a wooden spoon or a wooden spatula to mix it up until it turns into a dough.

Put the M&M's in the bowl and mix them in.

Heat the oven to 350 degrees (Farenheit).

Scoop the dough using a cookie dough scoop or a tablespoon scoop.

Place the dough on a baking sheet. Put the baking sheet in the oven and bake for 10 minutes.

DEVILED EGG CHICKS

INGREDIENTS

12 Large eggs
1/3 cup mayonnaise
1 teaspoon Dijon mustard
1/4 teaspoon garlic powder

1/4 teaspoon onion powder

1/8 teaspoon fine salt

1 small orange bell pepper

6 black olives

HOW TO MAKE HARD BOILED EGGS:

- 1. Place cold eggs in a large stainless steel pot, covering them with cold water. Bring to a rolling boil over high heat, uncovered. Once at a boil, reduce heat to keep a medium boil then set a timer for 8 minutes.
- 2. Prepare your ice water bath and as soon as the timer is done, quickly transfer the cooked eggs into ice water. Once completely cool, peel the hard shell off the eggs. If you have trouble peeling eggs, try peeling under a slow stream of water. Very fresh eggs do not peel easily.

HOW TO MAKE THE DEVILED EGG CHICKS:

- 1. Cut off a generous top third of the egg, and place the yolks in a medium bowl. Mash the 12 cooked yolks well with a fork.
- 2. Add the mayonnaise, dijon mustard, garlic powder, onion powder, and salt.

Mash everything together until smooth. Transfer the mixture into a ziplock or pastry bag.

- 3. Pipe generously into egg bases. Place the top third back over the base and press down slightly to adhere.
- 4. To make the chick eyes, use a straw to poke holes in an olive, then squeeze the straw to pop out the little circles of olives. Then place for the eyes. To make the beak, slice little triangles out of the orange pepper.
- 5. Set chicks on a platter and garnish as desired!
