# OHV - Off Highway Vehicle Guide

## Off-Highway Vehicle Operation in Palm Beach County

This brochure provides information about the safe and legal use of Off-Highway Vehicles (OHV) in Palm Beach County. OHVs include, but are not limited to:

- > motorized all-terrain-vehicles (ATV)
- > off-road/motorcross-style motorcycles
- > non-street legal golf carts
- > off-road utility vehicles
- > go-carts
- > wheel buggies
- > electric dirt bikes



**Florida State Statutes prohibit the operation of OHVs on public roadways\*.**

Palm Beach County Ordinance 2007-002, ATV Operation on Unpaved Roadways, was enacted on March 6, 2007 **prohibiting** the operation of ATVs at anytime of the day or night on an unpaved roadway within the county. Violations are punishable by a fine of \$500.

In Palm Beach County, OHVs may only be operated on private property you own or have permission to be on. For more information about seasonal and vehicle restrictions, visit [www.myfwc.com](http://www.myfwc.com).

**\*On February 27, 2007, Palm Beach County voted to opt out of Florida State Statute 316.2123(1) which allows ATV operation on unpaved roadways.**

## Safe OHV Operation

Our goal is to encourage safe and responsible OHV operation. Through OHV education and compliance of state and local OHV laws, we hope to prevent injuries and preserve state OHV riding areas and privileges.

OHVs are not toys. Serious injury can result from improper use, but with preparation and practice, OHVs can be an enjoyable form of outdoor recreation. **Children under the age of 16 are required by law to wear a helmet and eye protection. They must also complete a state approved ATV safety course when riding on public lands and have the certificate in their possession.**

## Frequently Asked Questions

### Where can I legally ride in Palm Beach County?

On private property you own or have permission to be on, and certain Wildlife Management Areas. Visit [www.myfwc.com](http://www.myfwc.com) for vehicle and seasonal restrictions. For state riding areas, visit [www.floridaohv.org](http://www.floridaohv.org).

### Do I need to wear a helmet?

Riders under the age of 16 are required to wear a helmet and eye protection by law. It is strongly recommended that riders of all ages wear a helmet and eye protection.

### Will receiving a traffic citation affect me when applying for my driver's license?

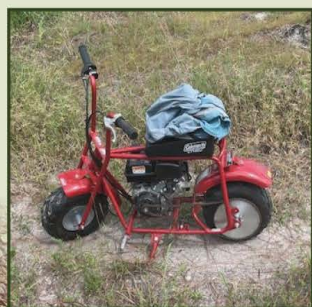
Yes. The one year period you are required to hold a learner's license will be extended for one year from the date of the conviction, or until you are 18 years old, whichever happens first.

### What happens if I am stopped on a public roadway and I'm not a licensed driver?

It is a misdemeanor offense when an unlicensed driver operates a motor vehicle on a public roadway. A court appearance is required, which carries up to a \$500 fine.

### If I'm an unlicensed minor, will my parents get in trouble?

Yes, it is a misdemeanor offense when a parent or guardian causes or knowingly permits their child or ward under the age of 18 years to operate a motor vehicle on a public roadway. A court appearance is required which carries up to a \$500 fine.



### Is a license, registration or insurance required to use an e-bike?

No, electric bikes are subject to the same regulations as regular bicycles and their riders.

### Is there a minimum age for e-bike use in unincorporated Palm Beach County?

Children under 16 years of age may operate Class 1 and Class 2 e-bikes while wearing a helmet. Anyone 16 years or older may also operate Class 3 e-bikes.

### What are the differences in Class 1, 2, and 3 e-bikes?

**Class 1 bikes** only assist when riders are pedaling and have a top speed of 20 mph.

**Class 2 bikes** have a throttle that allows motorized assistance even when the rider is not pedaling, They also have a 20 mph top speed.

**Class 3 bikes** only assist when riders are pedaling and have a top speed of 28 mph.

### How should e-bikes be used around pedestrians?

When operating an e-bike on a shared pedestrian pathway or recreational area riders must yield to pedestrians and give an audible signal before passing at no greater than 10 mph. Riders must slow to 10 mph or less when within 50 ft of a pedestrian.



# Data Center Update - Kathy Williams

## Community Members Continue Opposition to Proposed Data Center

The vote regarding the proposed data center has once again been postponed and is now scheduled for July 15, giving residents additional time to voice their concerns to county commissioners.

Community members opposed to the Tango project are encouraged to continue writing to commissioners and making their voices heard. Public participation remains an important part of the process.

**County commissioner meetings are held on Tuesdays at the downtown offices on Olive Avenue. The next meeting will take place on June 2. During the 2:00 PM "Matters by the Public" portion of the meeting, residents may speak for up to three minutes on any topic before the board. Several local residents opposing the project have spoken at recent meetings, and all concerned community members are encouraged to attend and participate.**

### Here are the key community and environmental concerns:

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL AND HEALTH IMPACTS**

**Noise Pollution:** Around-the-clock cooling fans, pumps, and backup generators can produce a constant low-frequency hum that travels for miles, disrupting sleep patterns, increasing stress levels, and negatively affecting people and animals alike. The Noise from a Hyperscale Data Center is upwards of 100 Decibels. That is like listening to a jackhammer or chainsaw all day long.

**Air Pollution from Diesel Generators:** Data centers rely on massive backup diesel generators for power interruptions, releasing significant particulate matter, nitrogen oxides, and greenhouse gases into our air.

**Water Consumption & Pollution:** These facilities require millions of gallons of water daily for cooling. This can strain local groundwater resources, potentially lower the water table, and increase the risk of contamination runoff affecting local wells.

**Heat Emissions:** The concentration of servers produces continuous waste heat, increasing local temperatures and affecting nearby microclimates and vegetation.

#### **IMPACT ON LOCAL WATER AND WILDLIFE**

**Well Water Concerns:** Increased industrial water use can lower aquifer levels, risking private well stability and quality, especially for households depending on groundwater.

**Nearby Ecosystems:** Proximity to the Everglades makes this development particularly alarming. Runoff, chemical discharge, and excess heat threaten delicate wetlands ecosystems and species already under environmental stress.

**Animal Health:** Horses, cattle, dogs, and cats may be affected by sustained noise, air quality decline, and altered water conditions. Prolonged stress and exposure to pollutants can lead to respiratory and behavioral issues in animals.

**Wildlife Disruption:** Local bird, amphibian, and reptile populations face habitat loss, light and noise disturbance, and disruption of natural behaviors due to constant artificial lighting and machinery.

#### **COMMUNITY & SAFETY CONCERNS**

**Proximity to Schools:** Having these industrial-scale facilities only 1,200 feet from Arden's new elementary school raises legitimate concerns about air quality, noise levels, and long-term exposure effects for children.

**Energy and Infrastructure Strain:** Hyperscale data centers consume astonishing amounts of electricity, which can increase our community's overall energy demand and carbon footprint. And more importantly, increase our electric bills. We may also experience more brownouts than we already do. Not good for those working from home!

Our community deserves transparency and a voice as this will directly affect us, Deer Run, White Fences, the acreage, Rustic Ranches and other local communities.

**I am urging everyone to get involved. Email or call your local legislative reps, tell your neighbors, attend meetings, rallies and protests. Make your voices heard.**

## **Pet Safety Warning for Florida Residents** - *Jeriamie Kensinger*

**Dead iguanas in Florida can carry a deadly risk:** botulism, a potent bacterial toxin that causes severe neurological damage and can be fatal to pets — especially dogs.

After cold snaps, invasive green iguanas often freeze, fall from trees, and die. As their carcasses begin to decay, *Clostridium botulinum* bacteria can produce a powerful neurotoxin. When dogs (or other pets) consume even parts of these decaying iguanas, they can rapidly develop botulism poisoning. Symptoms often start with rear-leg paralysis that can quickly progress, leading to full-body paralysis and death in severe cases.

In early 2026, multiple tragic cases were reported across South Florida. Pets became paralyzed or died after eating dead iguanas that had fallen during cold weather. Veterinarians note that these incidents tend to spike following freezes.

### **Pet owners are strongly advised to:**

- Check your yard thoroughly after cold snaps, especially under trees.
- Immediately remove any dead iguanas.
- Prevent dogs from scavenging wildlife carcasses.
- Contact your veterinarian right away if you suspect your pet has eaten a dead iguana.

**Better safe than sorry** — this hidden danger can turn a simple walk in the yard into a life-threatening emergency. Share this with fellow Florida pet parents!

# Helping Our Elderly Neighbors - *Cindy Fortin*

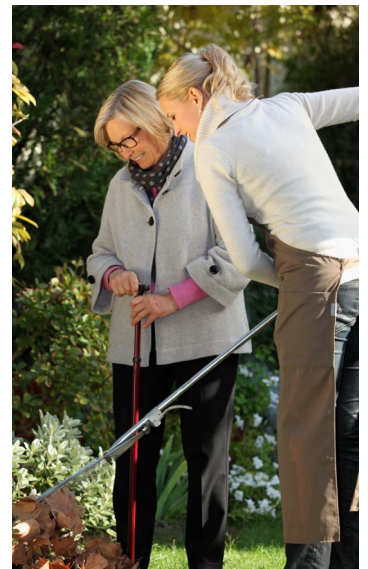

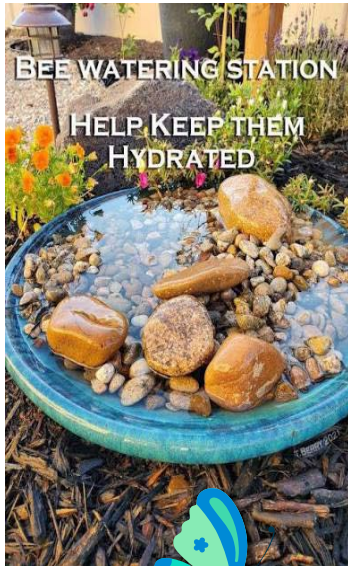

# Summer Safety Tips for Fox Trail Families - Jeriame Kensinger

Summer in South Florida brings sunshine, pool days, and afternoon thunderstorms. Here are important reminders to help keep your family, pets, and home safe during the hotter months ahead.



## 1. BEAT THE HEAT

- Stay hydrated! Drink plenty of water even if you don't feel thirsty.
- Limit outdoor activities between 10:00 AM and 4:00 PM when the sun and heat index are strongest.
- Never leave children, elderly family members, or pets in a parked car — temperatures inside can become deadly in minutes.
- Check on elderly neighbors and those with health conditions during extreme heat days.

## 2. POOL & WATER SAFETY

- Always supervise children near pools, lakes, or canals — drowning can happen quickly and silently.
- Keep pool gates locked and never prop them open.
- Enroll kids in swim lessons if they haven't already.
- Have a designated "water watcher" at parties or gatherings.



## 3. HURRICANE & STORM PREPAREDNESS

- Review your family emergency plan and update your emergency kit.
- Know your evacuation zone and have a plan for pets.
- Trim trees and secure loose outdoor items before storm season ramps up.
- Keep important documents in a waterproof container.
- Sign up for local emergency alerts through Palm Beach County.

## 4. LIGHTNING & THUNDERSTORM SAFETY

- "When thunder roars, go indoors!" Seek shelter immediately when you hear thunder.
- Stay off porches, under trees, and away from windows during storms.
- Avoid using corded phones, electronics, or plumbing during lightning storms.

## 5. MOSQUITO & PEST PROTECTION

- Eliminate standing water in flowerpots, buckets, and gutters to reduce mosquito breeding.
- Use EPA-approved insect repellent when outdoors, especially at dusk and dawn.
- Wear light-colored, loose-fitting clothing.
- Keep doors and windows closed or ensure screens are in good repair.



## 6. PET SAFETY

- Never leave pets outside for extended periods during extreme heat.
- Provide plenty of fresh water and shaded areas.
- Watch for heatstroke signs: excessive panting, drooling, or lethargy.
- Be cautious of wildlife — remove any dead animals promptly.



## 7. SUN PROTECTION

- Apply broad-spectrum sunscreen (SPF 30+) generously and reapply every 2 hours.
- Wear hats, sunglasses, and protective clothing.
- Children and those with fair skin need extra protection.

### A FINAL REMINDER:

Summer in South Florida is beautiful but can be intense. A little preparation goes a long way toward keeping our community safe and enjoyable.

#### **Contact the Fox Trail Board -**

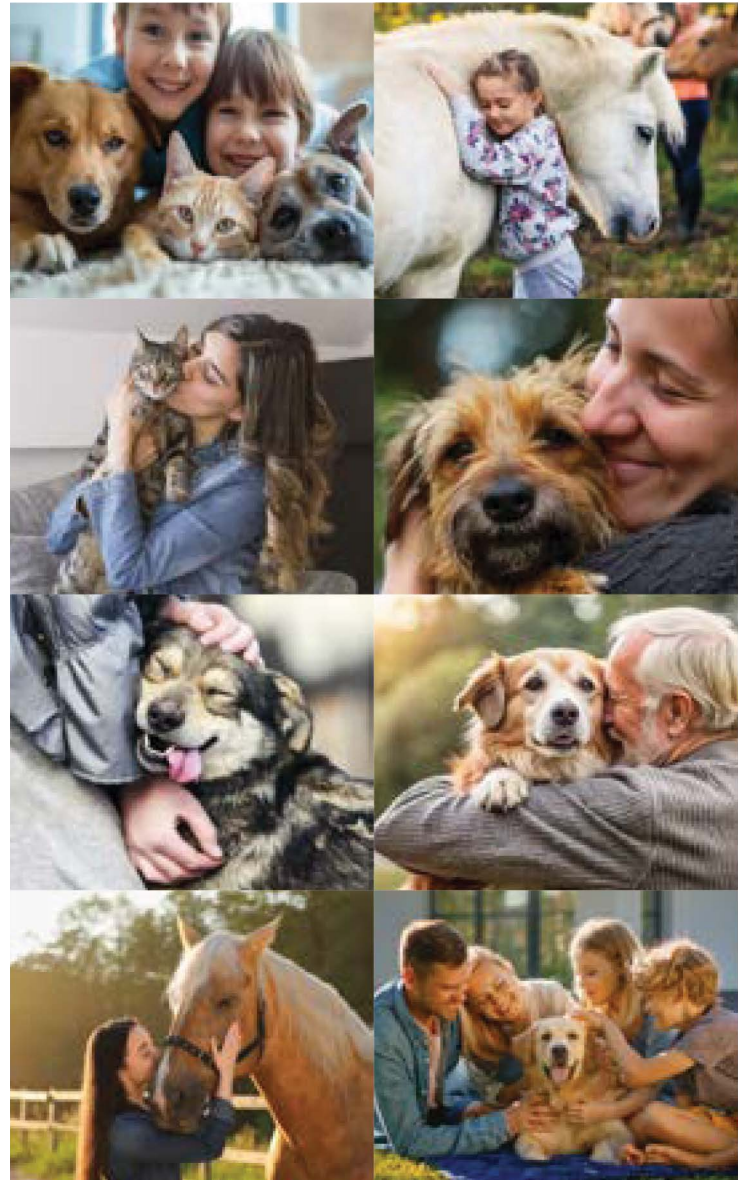
Call or text 561-879-0907 to report the found animal.

# SUMMER RECIPE IDEAS

## GRILLED PINEAPPLE CHICKEN



### INGREDIENTS

- 2 garlic cloves, finely chopped
- 1 cup unsweetened pineapple juice
- 3/4 cup ketchup
- 1/2 cup low-sodium soy sauce
- 1/2 cup (107 g.) packed light brown sugar
- 1 Tbsp. finely chopped peeled ginger
- 4 (6- to 8-oz.) boneless, skinless chicken breasts
- 1 tsp. vegetable oil, plus more for grill
- 1 pineapple, cored sliced into rings, halved
- Thinly sliced scallions, for serving

### DIRECTIONS

1. In a large bowl, whisk garlic, pineapple juice, ketchup, soy sauce, brown sugar, and ginger until combined.
2. Place chicken in a large resealable plastic bag. Pour in marinade. Refrigerate at least 2 hours and up to overnight.
3. Prepare a grill for high heat; preheat 5 minutes (or heat a grill pan over high heat). Clean and oil grates.
4. Grill chicken, basting with marinade and flipping occasionally, until charred and an instant-read thermometer inserted into thickest part registers 165°, about 8 minutes per side. Transfer to a plate.
5. In a medium bowl, toss pineapple with oil. Grill pineapple, flipping occasionally, until charred, about 2 minutes per side.
6. Transfer chicken and pineapples to a platter. Top with scallions.

## SMASH BURGER TACO



### INGREDIENTS

- 1 pound ground beef, 80/20 fat percentage
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt
- 10 cracks fresh black pepper
- 6 (six-inch) flour tortillas (flour works best they're more absorbent and the meat sticks better)
- 6 slices muenster or provolone cheese
- shredded lettuce, chopped white onion, and dill pickle chips for topping

### DIRECTIONS

1. Add all burger sauce ingredients to a bowl and whisk to combine. Refrigerate until ready to use; can be made 3 days in advance.
2. Mix the salt and pepper into a bowl. Evenly distribute it over the top and bottom of your ground beef chunk or log. Divide and roll your beef into 2 1/2 ounce balls. You don't want to be too rough with the meat or it will be tough. Less handling is better. Place each ball on a plate and put them in the fridge until your flat top is preheated.
3. Turn your flat top onto high heat, ungreased and allow the flat top to get ripping hot, hotter than you think is needed. This is important to getting crispy, juicy beef.
4. Place each ball on the hot flat top and set a 6 inch tortilla on top.
5. Use your smashing tool to press down very firmly on top of each tortilla, smashing the meat until it is as thin as it goes. Let them cook for 1 minute, then press down on top of each tortilla again, which will get some of the fat out for the edges to cook in. Then let cook undisturbed for 2 to 3 minutes. (The patties are so thin, this is definitely enough time for them to cook through.)
6. Use a stiff steel spatula to scrape underneath one of the burgers and see if it is browned and crispy. (Be forceful; the beef might be sticking a little to the surface but that's okay). If it's not browned and crispy, increase the temperature of your grill (but it should be smoking hot.) Once browned and crisp, flip smash burger tacos onto their tortilla side and let cook another 2ish minutes so the tortilla can crisp up by cooking on the surface. Top with cheese, which will melt as the tortillas crisp.

## CUCUMBER SALAD



### INGREDIENTS

- 2 English cucumbers, very thinly sliced
- 1/2 large red onion, very thinly sliced
- 1/4 cup white wine vinegar
- 1 tablespoon honey or agave nectar
- 1 teaspoon sea salt
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh dill
- Chopped fresh chives, optional, for garnish
- Freshly ground black pepper

### DIRECTIONS

1. In a large bowl, toss together the cucumber, onion, vinegar, honey, and salt. Chill for 20 minutes.
2. Transfer to a serving bowl, leaving any excess water behind. Sprinkle with the dill and chives, if desired. Season with several grinds of pepper and serve.
